**#470 WHAT PROMPTS A PERSON TO PRAY?** We pray because we are full of an infinite longing and God has created us men for himself.. Whether we avoid thinking about God or deny him—he is always there for us. He seeks us before we seek him; he yearns for us, he calls us. You feel lonely, have no one to talk with, and then sense that God is always available to talk. You are in danger and experience that a cry for help is answered by God.
