

ST ANDRE BESSETTE

Andre was born near Montreal, Canada on August 9th, 1845. His parents died when he was 12 years old so he travelled the country working as a wagon driver, baker, and other jobs. He prayed often and was a great example of faith and kindness for other young men. His parish priest recommended him to the Brothers of the Holy Cross, noting that Andre was a saint. Even though he could not ready or write, through prayer work and sacrifice he build a small chapel on the mountain top. Many people came to pray and donated for a larger chapel to be built. He was a simple kind soul who helped many souls experience healing in this chapel on the mountaintop. Close to 1 million people attended his funeral at his death at age 91. He was canonized a saint on Oct. 17th, 2010.
