## BEFOREYOUSTART

In order to get the most out of your free week of activities, you should understand a few of the Challenge and Conquest **METHODS OF MUNISTRY**. The curriculum is designed to be used with these specific methods in mind.

GENDER Specific Start off by splitting your group into boys and girls. For some parts of the meeting they will be together but other parts they will be in smaller gender specific groups.

TEAM BASED Now split the group into teams of 6- 10 kids. If you have a large group, you can split them into teams by ages (5<sup>th</sup> & 6<sup>th</sup> grade and 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> grade).

TEEN LED This is the secret to the meeting's success – choose the oldest teens in your group to lead the smaller teams you have formed. It helps that they are about 2 years older than the group they are leading.

SERVICE DRIVEN We try to make service a part of every meeting. At Christmas this should be easy. We will give you a few examples of popular Challenge & Conquest service projects.



## HOW TO USE THE FREE CURRICULUM

ASSEMBLE THE TEAM Meet with the team leaders and print off copies of this e book for them. Go through the steps and choose the activities that they think would work best with their age group and their teams. Work with them to prepare supplies.

Choose an icebreaker, sport or game to play for first 15 or 20 min. You will find 3 options of Christmas games that you can choose from in this book.

The question of the week is the theme of the activity. We try to help the teens discover the answer to the question by the end of the meeting. The Question of the week for the free curriculum is "What are Advent and Lent all about?" ## Before: Prep & Plan

This section is meant to be a guide to help you prepare this week's meeting & activity for your team.

**DEEPER NEED WE ARE RESPONDING TO:** I need to have a new relationship with God. **CONVICTIONS & DECISIONS TO REACH THIS WEEK:** Christ loves me and calls me to a long-lasting friendship with him. I will learn more about Christ's Church to grow closer to him.

#### WHAT IS THE ANSWER TO THE QUESTION?

Just as there are four seasons in a year, the church has its seasons for the Liturgy which we call Liturgical Seasons. Over the course of the year in each season, we get to know more about Christ's life and the word of God. There are different moments that we celebrate the life Jesus. We mark those moments with their own special readings, traditions and by using different colors in the Mass. Advent and Lent are part of these seasons.

#### **MAIN IDEAS:**



#### OOP

These ideas will help you answer this week's question. Highlight the main ideas that jump out at you so that you can have them clear in your mind.

- Each sport has its season and its own uniform. Soccer players don't wear hockey skates or
  play in winter time. When you go to Mass you probably notice that there are seasons and
  the priest is wearing different color of vestments. It's all for a reason.
- 2. Advent: During the Season of Advent we prepare for Jesus' coming as a Baby into our lives. It begins 4 weeks before Christmas. Christmas: The beautiful celebration of Christ's birth begins on December 25<sup>th</sup> and goes until the 12<sup>th</sup> day after Christmas. It ends on January 6<sup>th</sup>, when we celebrate the visit of the Three Wise Men (Epiphany). The Church is often decorated with red poinsettias.
- 3. **Ordinary Time**: After the Christmas we begin 36 weeks of 'ordinary' time. It helps us to imagine that most of Our Lord's life was spent in a quiet village called Nazareth.
- **4. Lent:** It is a time of preparation for Jesus' Suffering, Death and Resurrection, called 'Lent'. At this time we should aim toward, a spiritual rebirth. To accomplish this we're called to do three things: give alms, sacrifice, and deepen in prayer. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and ends with Easter Sunday. It is approximately 40 days long. **Easter:** The most important day of the year is Easter Sunday. The Season lasts for 50 days and ends on Pentecost.



# WHAT DOES THE CATECHISM SAY ABOUT THIS QUESTION?

## **SAINTS & INSPIRATIONAL STORIES**

#### ST JOSEPHINE BAKHITA

St Josephine lived a life of sacrifice and suffering on her way to discover the Catholic faith. When she discovered the faith she appreciated the richness of the liturgy and seasons. She identified with Christ during Lent and Easter and connect the little advents in her life with the Advent in the liturgy.

#### ST VINCENT FERRAR

St Vincent was known for being a great preacher and teacher across Europe with retreats and talks that would inspire people to understand and live their faith. He especially focused on helping them understand Lent and Advent to understand better the life of Christ.

## 1 Team Time

What is the plan this week for the beginning of the meeting? A game? Fun idea for snack? Special occasion? Icebreaker?

## 2 Getting Started

**Start** off with a prayer. You can say a Hail Mary, Glory Be or the Holy Spirit Prayer.

Who is there this week?

Let vour team know the question of the day: What are the liturgical seasons? Let them know what else you have planned for the meeting



## Experience – Activity:

#### **ACTIVITY 1: LENT & ADVENT HALO BALL**



Set Up: This game is a simple way to introduce your team to the components of Advent and Lent. Before the meeting, you will need to make a Faceketball Head Hoop which is a head band (sweat band works) with a mini office basket ball hoop attached. This can also be done with two baseball hats - just put one baseball hat upright and flip the other one over so it looks like a bucket. Attached the two hats by feeding a string through the air

holes located on the top of the caps. You only need four faceketball hoops or double hats - two for each team. You should put the signs that say ADVENT and LENT on one of the hoops or hats for each team. You can print off the Halo Ball Cards from the Team Leader USB or Resource Center. These cards should be crumpled up into balls and placed in a line down the middle of the room. (Another variation is to blow up water balloons – without water- and put the papers inside uncrumpled.) The teams should pick two people from their team to wear the double hat or faceketball thing. One person will have an Advent hoop and the other a Lent hoop. The hoopwearers should stand in the middle of the room on opposite sides of the line facing **one** another about 3 feet from the line of paper, so that people can make the shot.

> Explanation: The teams line up down the line of paper on either side and players from both teams alternate picking up a paper - reading it out loud and trying to make a shot into the correct hoop - ADVENT or LENT on the

opposing team. If they miss the shot, the ball goes back on the line and no point is given. If they get the shot in the correct hoop, they get the point and keep the ball. If they shoot the ball in the wrong hoop –(Advent instead of Lent or vice versa, then the team leader calls "foul" and the other team gets to try to take a shot.

The team with the most points when all the papers are gone wins.

**Running Variation:** Set up the papers all over the room and the two faceketball people at the end. When a person uncrumples a paper, they need to call FREEZE and all the other players stop. The crumpled paper is thrown – passed to the nearest person to the hoop and shot. After the shot is made the game resume until another person feels their team is ready in the right spots to call FREEZE.

#### **ACTIVITY 2: VIDEO ANSWERS**

You can watch these 2 videos with the girls to "cram" for the next part of the meeting. Make sure the girls listen to the answers so they are ready for Liturgical Calendar Game to follow.

#### **ACTIVITY 3: LITURGY MONSTER PUZZLE**



Set Up: Bigger is better. Print the cards from the Team Leader USB or resource center and glue or tape them to building blocks, small boxes or on square paper plates so that the puzzle is larger and more difficult and dynamic to complete. Remember to make 2 copies of everything for both teams. There are clue slips of paper that the team leader will randomly give out to the teams as the game progresses to help them out, so print those off

and cut them up. Play Christmas music even if it is the middle of May to help get the girls in the liturgical spirit.

**Explanation:** In this game, split the team into two groups. Each group is given 30 cards containing 30 major feast days that make up the Liturgical Calendar. They need to try to line up the pieces in the correct chronological order – in a circular shape on the floor. They can have one Challenge calendar or the YOUCAT Cheat Sheet found on the Team Leader USB or Resource Center to help them with the answers. When a group says they are finished, everyone stops. You can check the card's order against the answer key in private. If they are in the wrong order, the other groups gets an extra 60 seconds to continue while the group that had an attempted finish **gets a 60** second penalty.

**Discuss:** In this game we learned about the Church's official calendar called the Liturgical Calendar. We can learn more about the Church to understand Christ better and become closer to him. We should never stop trying to seek and learn the richness of our Catholic Faith.



Remember – the gospel reflection is a moment to help the girls understand how Jesus responded to this week's question with his life or his words in the gospel. Choose one of the girls to read the passage.

#### **GOSPEL READING** Parable of the Talents Luke 19:11-26

While they were listening to him speak, he proceeded to tell a parable because he was near Jerusalem and they thought that the kingdom of God would appear there immediately. So he said, "A nobleman went off to a distant country to obtain the kingship for himself and then to return. He called ten of his servants and gave them ten gold coins and told them, 'Engage in trade with these until I return.' His fellow citizens, however, despised him and sent a delegation after him to announce, 'We do not want this man to be our king.' But when he returned after obtaining the kingship, he had the servants called, to whom he had given the money, to learn what they had gained by trading. The first came forward and said, 'Sir, your gold coin has earned ten additional ones.' He replied, 'Well done, good servant! You have been faithful in this very small matter; take charge of ten cities.' Then the second came and reported, 'Your gold coin, sir, has earned five more.' And to this servant too he said, 'You, take charge of five cities.' Then the other servant came and said, 'Sir, here is your gold coin; I kept it stored away in a handkerchief, for I was afraid of you, because you are a demanding person; you take up what you did not lay down and you harvest what you did not plant.' He said to him, 'With your own words I shall condemn you, you wicked servant. You knew I was a demanding person, taking up what I did not lay down and harvesting what I did not plant; why did you not put my money in a bank? Then on my return I would have collected it with interest.' And to those standing by he said, 'Take the gold coin from him and give it to the servant who has ten.' But they said to him, 'Sir, he has ten gold coins." I tell you, to everyone who has, more will be given, but from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away. Now as for those enemies of mine who did not want me as their king, bring them here and slay them before me."

#### **GOSPEL INSIGHTS**

Talents are like gifts that God gives us. **They** are not just human talents like play the piano or being a great long distance runner. Talents (or this money in this passage) is symbolic of gifts and graces that God gives us each day and in our lives. The liturgy is one of those gifts. A lot of

people do not know what to do with it. They don't take time to understand it or realize the potential. They just put it away and ignore it. God wants us to understand and live the liturgical year close to him to get to know his Son's life.

#### REFLECTION QUESTIONS TO TALK ABOUT

- Have I ever thought of the Church as a gift or talent from God?
- Do I realize that I can just ignore the richness of my Catholic faith or I can take time to understand it fully? Like the liturgical season?
- What do you think God expects us to do with the gift or talent of the liturgical season?
- What does he expect us to do with Lent? Advent? Christmas? Easter?

### HOW DID CHRIST HELP US ANSWER THIS WEEK'S QUESTION IN THIS PASSAGE?

Christ answers this week's question by showing us how everything he gives us is for a reason and we need to look into our faith and understand its richness. Each time of the year is a season where were can grow in love for him.

Remember – your team and you are not the only people who have asked the question. Let's talk about other people who have asked themselves **TOP** this same question and found an answer.

## St Josephine Bahkita



Saint Josephine Bakhita was born in Sudan Africa in 1869. Her carefree and happy childhood, however, ended at 7-9 when slave traders captured her and forced her to walk 600 miles (960km) barefoot. She was kidnapped from Africa to become a slave and spent years suffering under cruel masters. When an Italian merchant bought her and brought her to Europe as a servant, she was treated with more kindness and became a nanny for the family's daughter. Once when the parents were away on a business trip Josephine and the daughter were left under the care of a local order of nuns - the Canossian sisters in Venice. There, Josephine heard about God and the Catholic faith. She asked to

be baptized and when the parents returned she told them she had decided to become a nun. She would refer to the Lord as her true Master. For the next 50 years this humble Daughter of Charity, a true witness to the love of God, lived in the Schio community, involved in various services: cooking, sewing, embroidery and attending to the poor. Her humility, simplicity and constant smile won the hearts of all the citizens. Her sisters in the community esteemed her for her constant sweet nature, exquisite goodness and deep desire to make the Lord known. She forgave all the people who treated who wrongly during her years of slavery and spent her time in the convent praying for their conversion and that they might make it to Heaven. She was canonized by Blessed John Paul II in 2000 and her feast day is February 8<sup>th</sup>. Josephine lived a hard life but she learned that Jesus was a friend to be trusted.



## St Vincent Ferrar



St. Vincent Ferrer is the patron saint of builders because of his fame for "building up" and strengthening the Church: through his preaching, missionary work, in his teachings.

He was born in Spain in 1357. He entered the Order of St. Dominic and soon spent time teaching in universities and preaching around Spain.

For a period of three years, he read solely Sacred Scripture, and eventually committed it to memory.

In 1390, he was asked to travel with Cardinal Pedro de Luna to France, but he soon returned home. Cardinal de Luna would soon after become the Pope at Avignon (during the western schism) and he summoned St. Vincent to be part of his entourage. In this way St. Vincent made unsuccessful efforts to put an end to the great schism.

He refused all special positions or promotions and only craved to be appointed a missionary. In a vision, he saw Jesus with Saint Dominic and Saint Francis, commanding him to "go through the world preaching Christ."

For the next 20 years, Vincent spread the Good News throughout Europe. He evangelized nearly every province of Spain, and preached in France, Italy, Germany, Flanders, England, Scotland, and Ireland. Numerous conversions followed his preaching, which God Himself assisted by the gift of miracles.

Though the Church was then divided by the great schism, the saint was honorably received in the districts subject to the two claimants to the Papacy. He lived to behold the end of the great schism and the election of Pope Martin V.

He died in 1419 when he was 69. He was canonized 35 years later.



This is the part of the meeting when you help your team to come to a decision to live their lives differently after discovering the answer to the question of the week and connecting to their own life. Ask them these questions as a recap of the meeting & come up with a good team promise.

What did we find out in the activity, gospel and saints? What is the answer to the question of the week?

The Church uses a Liturgical Calendar to help us get to know more about God. The best way to do that is by getting to know his Son. There are different moments we celebrate of Jesus' life in the Liturgical seasons.

How can this meeting and question effect my life this week and in the future?

What are we going to decide together to do differently this week? What is our team promise?

Ask the girls first because it needs to be their decision. If there are no Ideas, then here is a suggestions Pay attention in mass this week to what feast day it is and what part of Jesus' life we are celebrating.)

What was our team promise last week? Did we do it?



What do we need to work on this week during the meeting for our project?

What do we need to work on after our meeting to be ready for next week?

#### **QUESTION:**

#### WHAT ARE THE LITURGICAL SEASONS ADVENT & LENT?

#### **NEED WE ARE RESPONDING TO:**

I need to have a new relationship with God: deep, real, captivating and founded on the truth.

#### CONVICTIONS & DECISIONS TO REACH IN THE ACTIVITY:

Christ loves me and calls me to a long-lasting friendship with him. I will learn more about Christ's Church to grow closer to him.

#### WHAT IS THE ANSWER TO THE QUESTION?

Just as there are four seasons in a year, the church has its seasons for the Liturgy which we call Liturgical Seasons. Over the course of the year in each season, we get to know more about Christ's life and the word of God. There are different moments that we celebrate the life Jesus. We mark those moments with their own special readings, traditions and by using different colors in the Mass. Advent and Lent are part of these seasons.



#### OOP

These ideas will help you answer this week's question. Highlight the main ideas that jump out at you so that you can have them clear in your mind.

#### MAIN IDEAS:

- 1. Have you ever played sports? The only problem I can find with sports is that they each have a time and a place. You can't just play ice hockey outside in a league during the summer months. Nor can you play golf in the winter. Each sport has its season.
- 2. Each sport also has its own uniform. A Football player doesn't wear golf pants and a polo shirt. Much less the ridiculous dressy shoes they wear. Nor does a golfer wear a swimsuit. Each season has its sports and each sport has its uniform.
- 3. When you go to Sunday Mass you probably notice something different. Sometimes the priest is wearing red and other times green. Sometimes he wears violet or white. What's with the colors and the flower arrangements any way?
- 4. God wants us to get to know him but he wants us to do it bit by bit. He's like a good friend. He doesn't force entry into your life. You get to know him at your pace. Just as there are four seasons in a year, the church has its seasons for the Liturgy. The word Liturgy comes from an ancient Greek word meaning 'service'. We call the church seasons, Liturgical Seasons. Each of these seasons has its own tempo.

PREP & PLAN

#### PREP & PLAN THE ACTIVITY

Throughout the year, these seasons, help us get to know more about God. The best way to do that is by getting to know his son, Jesus. There are different moments that we celebrate the life Jesus. We mark those moments with their own special flavors, especially by using different colors in the Mass.

- 5. Just because the Church teaches us about Jesus with a tempo doesn't mean that it uses the same Calendar as the one that's hanging up on a wall with twelve months, January to December to mark the months of the year. In the Church we mark the moments of our Lord's life with 'Liturgical Seasons'.
  - Advent: During the Season of Advent we prepare for Jesus' coming as a Baby into our lives. It begins 4 weeks before Christmas. It usually begins around December 1st. Priests usually wear violet during this time.
  - Christmas: The beautiful celebration of Christ's birth isn't just about giving or receiving gifts, it's about accepting the most important gift into our lives, Jesus. It begins on December 25<sup>th</sup> and goes until the 12<sup>th</sup> day after Christmas. It ends on January 6<sup>th</sup>, when we celebrate the visit of the Three Wise Men (Epiphany). The Church is often decorated with red poinsettias. The priest wears white, gold, or silver to mark the importance of these festive days.
  - Ordinary Time: After Christmas, we begin 36 weeks of 'ordinary' time.
    This doesn't mean that life should be boring. However, it helps us to
    imagine that most of Our Lord's life was spent in a quiet village called
    Nazareth. Green is the usual color of these Liturgical celebrations.
  - Lent: Ordinary Time is broken up with a time of preparation for Jesus' Suffering, Death and Resurrection, called 'Lent'. The word Lent comes from an Old-English word meaning the lengthening of the days towards springtime. At this time we should aim toward, a spiritual rebirth. To accomplish this we're called to do three things: give alms, sacrifice, and deepen in prayer. Violet is the color of Lent. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and ends with Easter Sunday. It is approximately 40 days long and we're called to offer up something during this time.
  - Easter: The most important day of the year is Easter Sunday. Jesus, victorious, rises from the dead and brings us the new springtime. It's the most special moment in the Liturgical Year. The Church even teaches us that if you don't receive communion at all throughout the year, you should at least receive communion during the Easter Season. The Season lasts for 50 days and ends on Pentecost Sunday.

#### PREP & PLAN THE ACTIVITY

6. Liturgical Colors: Green: Ordinary Time / Red: Celebrations to do with Martyrs, the Holy Spirit (Pentecost), and Jesus' Passion (Good Friday) / White: This color is used for special days, days in honor of the Sacred Heart and Mary, and it can be used instead of any color for almost all celebrations. / Violet: A color used for both Advent and Lent. This color is also used for funerals and masses to commemorate departed souls. Rose: may be used on the Third Sunday of Advent, Gaudete Sunday, and on the Fourth Sunday of Lent, Laetare Sunday.

#### LENT & ADVENT HALOBALL

#### CHECK IT OUT:

This game is a simple way to introduce your team to the components of Advent and Lent.





#### MAKE IT HAPPEN:

- 1. Before the meeting, you will need to make 4 Faceketball Head Hoops which is a head band (sweat band works) with a mini office basket ball hoop attached. This can also be done with two baseball hats just put one baseball hat upright and flip the other one over so it looks like a bucket. Attached the two hats by feeding a string through the air holes located on the top of the caps or use some duct tape. You only need four faceketball hoops or double hats two for each team. You should put the signs that say ADVENT and LENT on one of the hoops or hats for each team. You can print off the Halo Ball Cards from the Team Leader USB drive or Online Resource Center. These cards should be crumpled up into balls and placed in a line down the middle of the room.
- 2. The teams should pick two people from their team to wear the double hat or faceketball thing. One person will have an Advent hoop and the other a Lent hoop. The hoop-wearers should stand in the middle of the room on opposite sides of the line facing one another about 3 feet from the line of paper, so that people can make the shot.
- 3. The teams line up down the line of paper on either side and players from both teams alternate picking up a paper reading it out loud and trying to make a shot into the correct hoop ADVENT or LENT on the opposing team. If they miss the shot, the ball goes back on the line and no point is given. If they get the shot in the correct hoop, they get the point and keep the ball. If they shoot the ball in the wrong hoop (Advent instead of Lent or vice versa) then the team leader calls "foul" and the other team gets to try to take a shot. The team with the most points when all the papers are gone wins.

#### **CHANGE IT UP:**

Set up the papers all over the room and the two faceketball people at the end. When a person uncrumples a paper, they need to call FREEZE and all the other players stop. The crumpled paper is thrown – passed to the nearest person to the hoop and shot. After the shot is made the game resume until another person feels their team is ready in the right spots to call FREEZE.

#### MAKE IT HAPPEN:

#### GOSPEL READING:

LUKE 19: 11-26

#### PARABLE OF THE TALENTS

While they were listening to him speak, he proceeded to tell a parable because he was near Jerusalem and they thought that the kingdom of God would appear there immediately. So he said, "A nobleman went off to a distant country to obtain the kingship for himself and then to return. He called ten of his servants and gave them ten gold coins and told them, 'Engage in trade with these until I return.' His fellow citizens, however, despised him and sent a delegation after him to announce, 'We do not want this man to be our king.' But when he returned after obtaining the kingship, he had the servants called, to whom he had given the money, to learn what they had gained by trading. The first came forward and said, 'Sir, your gold coin has earned ten additional ones.' He replied, 'Well done, good servant! You have been faithful in this very small matter; take charge of ten cities.' Then the second came and reported, 'Your gold coin, sir, has earned five more.' And to this servant too he said, 'You, take charge of five cities.' Then the other servant came and said, 'Sir, here is your gold coin; I kept it stored away in a handkerchief, for I was afraid of you, because you are a demanding person; you take up what you did not lay down and you harvest what you did not plant.' He said to him, 'With your own words I shall condemn you, you wicked servant. You knew I was a demanding person, taking up what I did not lay down and harvesting what I did not plant; why did you not put my money in a bank? Then on my return I would have collected it with interest.' And to those standing by he said, 'Take the gold coin from him and give it to the servant who has ten.' But they said to him, 'Sir, he has ten gold coins.' 'I tell you, to everyone who has, more will be given, but from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away. Now as for those enemies of mine who did not want me as their king, bring them here and slay them before me."

#### **GOSPEL INSIGHTS:**

Talents are like gifts that God gives us. They are not just human talents like being able to play the piano or being a great long distance runner. Talents (or money in this passage) is symbolic of gifts and graces that God gives us each day and in our lives. The liturgy is one of those gifts. A lot of people do not know what to do with it. They don't take time to understand it or realize the potential. They just put it away and ignore it. God wants us to understand and live the liturgical year close to him to get to know his Son's life.

## HOW DID CHRIST HELP US ANSWER THIS WEEK'S QUESTION IN THIS PASSAGE?

Christ answers this week's question by showing us how everything he gives us is for a reason and we need to look into our faith and understand its richness. Each time of the year is a season where were can grow in love for him.

#### SAINT STORY:

#### ST JOSEPHINE BAHKITA

Saint Josephine Bakhita was born in Sudan Africa in 1869. Her carefree and happy childhood, however, ended at 7-9 when slave traders captured her and forced her to walk 600 miles (960km) barefoot. She was kidnapped from Africa to become a slave and spent years suffering under cruel masters. When an Italian merchant bought her and brought her to Europe as a servant, she was treated with more kindness and became a nanny for the family's daughter. Once when the parents were away on a business trip Josephine and the daughter were left under the care of a local order of nuns – the Canossian sisters in Venice. There, Josephine heard about God and the Catholic faith. She asked to be baptized and when the parents returned she told them she had decided to become a nun. She would refer to the Lord as her true Master. For the next 50 years this humble Daughter of Charity, a true witness to the love of God, lived in the Schio community, involved in various services: cooking, sewing, embroidery and attending to the poor. Her humility, simplicity and constant smile won the hearts of all the citizens. Her sisters in the community esteemed her for her constant sweet nature, exquisite goodness and deep desire to make the Lord known. She forgave all the people who treated who wrongly during her years of slavery and spent her time in the convent praying for their conversion and that they might make it to Heaven. She was canonized by Blessed John Paul II in 2000 and her feast day is February 8th.

#### SAINT STORY:

#### ST VINCENT FERRAR



St. Vincent Ferrer is the patron saint of builders because of his fame for "building up" and strengthening the Church: through his preaching, missionary work, in his teachings. He was born in Spain in 1357. He entered the Order of St. Dominic and soon spent time teaching in universities and preaching around Spain. For a period of three years, he read solely Sacred Scripture, and eventually committed it to memory. In 1390, he was asked to travel with Cardinal Pedro de Luna to France, but he soon returned home. Cardinal de Luna would soon after become the Pope at Avignon (during the western schism) and he summoned St. Vincent to be part of his entourage. In this way St. Vincent made unsuccessful efforts to put an end to the great schism. He refused all special positions or promotions and only craved to be appointed a missionary. In a vision, he saw Jesus with Saint Dominic and Saint Francis, commanding him to "go through the world preaching Christ." For the next 20 years, Vincent spread the Good News throughout Europe. He evangelized nearly every province of Spain, and preached in France, Italy, Germany, Flanders, England, Scotland, and Ireland. Numerous conversions followed his preaching, which God Himself assisted by the gift of miracles. Though the Church was then divided by the great schism, the saint was honorably received in the districts subject to the two claimants to the Papacy. He lived to behold the end of the great schism and the election of Pope Martin V. He died in 1419 when he was 69. He was canonized 35 years later.

# ICE BREAKER AND GAME IDEAS

#### 12 Days of Christmas Game

Separate the group together in 12 different groups. The groups can be of any size, as long as they are relatively the same size. Each group is assigned one gift from the song. For instance, a partridge in a pear tree, 9 lords a leaping, etc. As we played and sang the song "12 days of Christmas" the kids in each group had to act out what was sung in that verse as the leader pointed to them. The group needs to come up with their own actions or routines, etc. The game lasts as long as the music does, of course. You may want to give a prize to the group that comes up with the funniest, best, most original gesture for the "gift" that they are assigned.

#### Christmas Song Pictionary

Girls can compete in teams in a Christmas Song-themed version of the classic game, Pictionary. Simply write the names of Christmas carols on cards and get some paper and makers.

#### Christmas Match Game

Purchase different types of inexpensive Christmas wrapping paper. Cut out squares from the wrapping paper based on the size of your group. Make sure you have two squares that match but make all the others different. Fold each square and place inside a separate plain envelope. Let each student pick an envelope then say, "The first two people who find matching squares will win a prize." If your group is larger you can have more than one set of matching Christmas paper squares. Tell them to start then award the prize to the matching team. An alternative idea is to have one or two matches for every square and give out a prize to the FIRST two people who match their squares. Another twist is to do this game in the dark and let students use a flashlight or the light from their cell phones to find matching Christmas paper squares.

#### Deck the Balls

Deck the Balls is another game for teams of two. Using an empty wrapping paper tube, the first player uses suction from his mouth to lift an ornament with the tube, and transfer it to the second player. The second player must receive the ornament in the same fashion (with a wrapping paper tube and suction), and then hang it on an awaiting string (hung in a clothesline fashion). To win this game, players must hang three ornaments in this method in a minute or less.

#### Christmas Ball Game

Christmas Ball is based on the regular *Minute to Win It* game called <u>Egg Roll</u>. To play, you must use a gift-wrapped box (about the size of a shirt box) as a fan to move a round Christmas ornament across the floor and into a marked square. The box must not touch the ornament while the game is in play. You can vary the distance that the ornament must be fanned depending on the age of the people playing.

#### Christmas Ball ConveYor

Christmas Ball Conveyor is played with two people. They stand, facing each other, at a distance to be determined by how difficult you wish the challenge to be. A ribbon is wrapped around both players' waists, creating a loop surrounding them both. The first player has a bowl with Christmas ornaments on hooks as well as a small Christmas tree beside him. To play the game, the first player hooks an ornament on the ribbon. The two players must then spin in tandem in order to move the ornament all the way around the ribbon, ending up back with the first player, who must then hang it on the tree. Make the game more difficult by requiring more ornaments to be transferred around the "conveyor."

#### PRESENTING THE NEED TO MY TEAM

- Do you have a sock drawer at home? Homeless people do not.
- People who are homeless are always in desperate need of new socks.
- Homeless people put their socks through more wear and tear in a week than most socks see in a year.
- Most are forced to sleep with their shoes on to prevent them from being stolen.
- Most homeless spend most of their days walking as they are constantly being prodded to move along.
- Foot wellness is a major concern for overall physical well being of anyone, but especially the homeless.



- Did you know that having cold feet can lower your immunity system? In 2005, there was a study that proved people are almost 30% more likely to come down with a flu or sickness when their feet are cold for just 20 minutes a day. The homeless can spend many hours a day with cold feet. What can we do as a team to help?

You could partner up with a sock drive organization such as <a href="https://www.confortsocks.org">www.confortsocks.org</a> You can collect just new socks, and ideally other items to stuff in the socks, such as prayer cards, nutrition bars, or even pack brown bag lunches as well to deliver.  Plan: You will need to plan the collection locations, dates and times. Also plan the delivery date and time for dropping off the actual socks (and optional brown bag lunches) that you collected at the homeless shelter.	XXXX
2	Flyer: Design a flyer – use the logo and name of this project on the flyer. You could accept donations of packages of new socks and cash/checks to be able to purchase other items to stuff into the socks or to also make brown paper bag lunches.	XXXX
3	<b>Promote:</b> Make sure to promote well: during weekend Masses, in the parish bulletin and on social media.	XXXX

5	Collection #1: This week should be the first collection of socks and donations. Weekend Masses work well. Schedule the boys appropriately. Make sure to have a place designated to store the collection (If not at the parish, perhaps one of the dads can volunteer to keep in his garage)	XXXX
6	Collection #2: Ideally should be a different location — such as outside a local department store, etc. Make sure to receive permission for the project well in advance.	XXXX
7	Sort and Fun!: Sort all of the socks, and begin gathering items to stuff into the socks. Roll the socks into balls and have a winter snowball sock fight with your team!	XXXX
8	Stuff and Deliver: The final week, stuff as many socks as you can with items that you gathered or purchased. Make brown paper bag lunches in an assembly line. Carpool to homeless shelter to deliver the socks and lunches if possible. This way the boys will see first hand the desperate need of the homeless.	Service Project: There is a short Gospel Reflection to help motivate the boys for this apostolic project.

## PROJECT OVERVIEW

#### TACTICS BY AREAS

#### LOCATION

- Parish this should be one of the two collection sites. Promoting a week or two in advance is ideal, telling people to bring packages of new socks and money to help the homeless. Collection should take place after weekend Masses.
- Department Stores Obtain permission in advance. Setup outside the entrance to the store. Ask people going into the store to consider buying a package of socks for the homeless and your groups sock drive. You could also ask for nutrition bars for stuffing into the socks as well.

#### **PROVISIONS**

- Flyers (optional posters and road signs)
- Items for stuffing (ideas)
  - · Saint cards
  - Nutrition bars
  - Cheese and crackers or other type snacks
  - Candy
  - Wet wipes, toothbrushes, travel toothpaste, razors, etc.
- Items for brown paper bag lunches
  - Brown paper bags
  - Bread
  - Peanut butter and jelly
  - Sandwich bags
  - Fruit or other snack
  - Napkin
  - · Drink box or bottle of water



#### TACTICS BY AREAS

#### RESPONSIBILITIES

- Flyers, posters, road signs (one or two members)
- Parish bulletin and / or after Mass announcements (one or two members)

  These should be very well done.
- Socks: One member should be responsible for storing all of the socks collected.
- Donations: One member should be in charge of collected donations (working with group treasurer or parish office)
- Promotion: All members should help promote to everyone they know.
- Schedule: One or two members should make the schedule for who will work the collections times and dates
- Stuff items: Two members should be in charge of obtaining items to stuff into the new socks.
- Brown paper bag lunches: Two members should be in charge of gathering the items needed to make brown paper bag lunches.

#### CONTACTS

- Pastor: To provide permission to do this project, promote and collect socks and donations after Masses.
- Dads: Should be asked to help and participate in this project, especially to
  organize carpools to drop off the socks and lunches at the homeless shelter
  location.
- Homeless shelter staff: To arrange drop off and discuss any specific items they are in need of.
- Benefactors: People who you ask to donate socks and money can be more aware of the needs of the homeless in their area.



#### DEBRIEFING

#### SPECIAL OPS

- Parish office: Coordinate with the parish office for this project. See if they have a place to store the collected socks, etc.
- When stuffing the socks and lunches, use several tables and make an assembly line or two. Ensure to allocate enough time to assemble the target number you want. If there are more sock than you can stuff, remaining socks can simply be left in the packages to donate to the homeless shelter.
- When the boys (ideally) deliver the socks and lunches, have them also serve a
  meal to the homeless. This would need to be arranged well in advance with the
  shelter staff.
- Investigate ideas by scouring websites regarding sock drives, homeless shelter needs, etc.
- Don't forget to have fun! Have a sock war! Play similar to a snowball fight or play dodgeball style rules.

#### **CONTINGENCY PLAN**



- Instead of having an all out sock drive, you could simply ask each boy to bring
  a package of new socks, stuff and deliver them to the homeless shelter. This
  will still have an impact on the boys, but not spread the awareness and need to
  others.
- You could do the same for brown paper bag lunches. Simply assign each boy items to bring ahead of time, make an assembly line, produce the lunches and deliver.
